#### Current Program vs. RJP Re-design

- Targets early offenders
- P.O. experience determines
   type of service referrals
- 90 day program
- Logic model measures effort and effect of contracted services.

- Targets early offenders
- Objective tools determine types of services indicated
- Length of program varies by need (up to 180 days)
- Logic model also measures
   effort for select non-contracted
   services

#### FY 2008 Data Analysis - Referrals

5797 Referrals

95% of referrals for offenses such as:

- petty theft (1055),
- fighting/misdemeanor assault (1048),
- obstruction (650),
- simple possession (541),
- vandalism (470),
- drunk in public (296),
- trespassing (280),
- tobacco (269)

# FY 2008 Data Analysis - Youth

4984 youth

- 87% 1st time offenders
- 11% 2<sup>nd</sup> time offenders
- 2% are 3<sup>rd</sup> + offenders


#### **RJP Asset Distribution**



- Researched various diversion programs to understand a number of models






#### Needs Assessment/Targeted Services

- Needs assessment leads to targeted services to address four life domains (personal, family, school, community)
- Conduct needs assessment on approximately 20% of youth based on analysis of 4984 youth
- An intervention team approach, when appropriate

#### Offense Levels

- 1 Low level offenses include offenses with no victim and no time misdemeanors and infractions (offenses not requiring a JRS entry)
- 3 Medium level offenses include offenses with an identifiable victim and restitution totaling less than \$500
- 5 High level offenses include either an identifiable victim, restitution totaling more than \$500 but less than \$1000, a felony, or other serious offense(s)

#### Low Level of Service (1-3)

- Assessment: P.O. evaluation of JCR and minor's history. The PO has discretion to raise the level of service by one level
- Sanction: Letter of reprimand
- Services: None indicated

# Medium Level of Service (4-5)

- **Assessment:** P.O. evaluation or formal assessment tool depending on P.O. discretion. The P.O. may raise or lower the level of service by one level based on the results of the assessment tool.
- Sanction(s):
  - Verbal reprimand
  - Referral to Traffic Hearing Officer 30 day contract to include:
  - - Apology letter
      16 or less hours of community service
- - Single 1 day competency development class such as COPS, SAVE, smoking cessation, etc.
  - Referral to truancy programs, as needed.

  - Parent-teen mediation

  - Job skill and search services (16.5+ years old)

# High Level of Service (6-7)

- Assessment: P.O. utilizes formal assessment tool to target specific service referrals and to raise or lower the level of service by one level.
- Sanction(s):
  - Referral to Traffic Hearing Officer
  - 30-90 day contract
    - Restitution
    - 32 or less hours of community service
    - Letter of Apology

# High Level of Service (cont'd...)

- Services
  - Multiple 1 day competency development classes such as COPS, SAVE, smoking cessation, etc.
  - Referrals to truancy programs
  - Mentoring
  - Competency Development Services including:
    - Victim awareness
    - Victim offender mediation
    - Job skill and search services (16.5+ years old)
    - Parent-teen mediation
    - Parenting classes
    - Violence Prevention and Gang Prevention
    - Outpatient Substance Abuse and Intervention Services
    - Law Related Education/Property Offenses
    - Service Learning
    - Individual/family counseling
  - Family therapy

### Informal Supervision (8+)

- Assessment: P.O. utilizes formal assessment tool to target specific service referrals.
- Sanction(s):
  - 90-180 day contract
  - Restitution
  - 64 or less hours of community service
  - Letter of Apology



  - Referrals to truancy programs

  - Competency Development Services including:
    - Victim awareness
    - Victim offender mediation

#### Changes to Probation Officer Role

- Administration of assessment tool
- Interpretation of assessment tool results
- Increased referrals for services
- Increased victim contact
- Increased initial interview from 45 min to 1½ hours

# Current Program vs. RJP Re-design Cost of Services

- Competency Development and Counseling Services: \$1.48 Million to serve 2786 youth -\$530/client
- Mentoring: \$206K to serve 260 youth \$792/client
- Competency Development and Counseling Services: \$605K to serve 1000 youth -\$605/client
- Mentoring: \$260K to serve 260 youth \$1000/client
- Family Therapy: \$380K to serve 100 youth \$3800/client
- Support services: \$75K to serve 50 youth \$1500/client
- Total cost \$1.6 Million
- Total cost \$1.3 Million

# Competency Development Services by Region

### Balance of FY 10 Service Needs

- CDS including counseling
  - 750 youth @ \$605/client = \$454K
- Mentoring
  - 195 youth @ \$1000/client = \$195K
- Family Therapy
  - 5 75 youth @ \$3800/client = \$285K
- Support Services
  - 38 youth @ \$1500/client = \$57K

#### Balance of FY 10 Funding

- 3Q FY 10 Services Needed = \$991K
- 3Q FY 10 Available Funding = \$608.5K
- 3Q FY 10 Resources Needed = \$382.5K
